1 forsa which means opportunity in arabic is a new economic inclusion program of the government of the arab republic of egypt implemented by the ministry of social solidarity moss one major goal of the program is to graduate beneficiaries of takaful to economic self reliance by enabling them to engage in wage employment or small scale productive enterprises 2 the forsa program began in 2023 after significant delays obstacles to implementation included the covid 19 pandemic nationwide inflation subsequent to the ukraine russia war resulting in funding challenges for asset purchases and administrative challenges with procurement approvals by the ministry of finance forsa implementation was conducted under moss super vision by local non governmental organizations ngos while a few ngos received their first payments in the first quarter of 2022 most ngos received their first payments in october 2022 delaying program implementation to february 2023 according to the moss in the second half of 2023 households receiving assets through the program increased from around 3 000 9 to 10 302 29 out of a target of 35 000 households through 49 contracted ngos and two private hiring firms and the number of participants receiving a job has increased from 3 324 23 in august to 5 392 38 by end of november of 2023 out of a target of 14 314 households through 22 ngos and two private firms

ethiopia s productive safety net programme psnp one of the largest social protection programs in africa has improved food security and strengthened recovery from shocks yet it has achieved limited progress in raising incomes or diversifying livelihoods in response policymakers have layered graduation models onto the psnp to

promote sustainable self reliance this note synthesizes evaluation evidence from ngo and government led initiatives ngo led intensive high cost models increased assets and incomes in the short to medium term but rarely enabled households to exit the program ngo led lighter touch approaches improved resilience but delivered minimal gains in overall well being government led efforts have faced persistent delivery challenges including overstretched systems weak credit access and limited market linkages broader structural constraints such as shrinking landholdings scarce nonfarm opportunities and recurrent drought and other shocks further undermine the promise of graduation programming in this context the review highlights six policy lessons on design financing and integration with broader development strategies to shape more effective approaches going forward

the state of economic inclusion report 2021 sheds light on one of the most intractable challenges faced by development policy makers and practitioners transforming the economic lives of the world s poorest and most vulnerable people economic inclusion programs are a bundle of coordinated multidimensional interventions that support individuals households and communities so they can raise their incomes and build their assets programs targeting the extreme poor and vulnerable groups are now under way in 75 countries this report presents data and evidence from 219 of these programs which are reaching over 90 million beneficiaries governments now lead the scale up of economic inclusion interventions often building on preexisting national programs such as safety nets livelihoods and jobs and financial inclusion and 93 percent of the total beneficiaries are covered by government programs the report offers four important contributions a detailed analysis of the nature of these programs the people living in extreme poverty and vulnerability whom they support and the organizational challenges and opportunities inherent in designing and leading them an evidence review of 80 quantitative and qualitative evaluations of economic inclusion programs in 37 countries the first multicountry costing study including both government led and other economic inclusion programs indicating that programs show potential for cost efficiencies when integrated into national systems four detailed case studies featuring programs under way in bangladesh india peru and the sahel which highlight the programmatic and institutional adaptations required to scale in quite diverse contexts data from the report are available on the pei data portal peiglobal.org where users can explore and submit data to build on this baseline

scale up process among their lessons are the importance of building the capacity to implement and sustain the reforms adjusting for local culture and policy ensuring quality control providing the necessary infrastructure and fostering a sense of ownership the process is iterative and complex and requires cooperation among many actors who must ensure that the results align with goals

this food policy report reviews resilience processes activities and outcomes by examining a number of case studies of initiatives by nongovernmental organizations ngos to enhance resilience capacity and draws implications for policymakers and other stakeholders looking to strengthen resilience

social protection programs public or private initiatives that aid the poor and protect the vulnerable against livelihood risks can effectively be used to assist those trapped or at the risk of being trapped in chronic poverty these programs aim to address chronic poverty through redistribution and protect vulnerable households from falling below the poverty line although investments in social protection programs are often motivated by equity concerns they can also contribute to economic growth by for example encouraging savings creating community assets and addressing market imperfections despite their potential and proliferation not enough is known about social protection programs in africa the 2017 2018 annual trends and outlook report ator reduces this knowledge gap by focusing on the potential of such programs on the continent and the corresponding opportunities and challenges the chapters of the report highlight the benefits of these programs not only to their direct recipients but also others in the community through spillover effects they also underscore the importance of appropriate design and sustainability to fully realize the potential of social protection programs
